Do You Remember? WESTMORELAND CITY V.F.D. The Early Years




hen I read the early history of the Westmoreland City V. F. D., from the organization's record books (compiled by past Fire Chief, Harry McCracken), two things stood out loud and clear. First: Some things never change; fundraising required as much effort and imagination 90 years ago as it does today. Second: It's clear that, in terms of providing community services, the organization goes far beyond fire protection.

In the early years, Westmoreland City depended on the Irwin and Manor Fire Departments to respond

to community emergencies. Then, in 1924, the town experienced a disastrous fire at the Sadler Hotel on Main Street. John Nanno, one of the firefighters, was burned to death in the blaze. The following year, a group of citizens or-



In 1926, the company purchased its first fire truck, a Model T Ford, built by Oben Chain Boyer Company of

This two-room school was located to the right of the existing Westmoreland City School Building. When the old school was torn down, the material was used to build the first fire department truck garage.




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Ohio. The initials "O. B." were mounted on the radiator. Bill Edwards was the primary driver; the truck was fondly referred to as "Old Bill." The Model T was kept in several different locations until a temporary truck garage was built on Third Street.

Charles McCracken, President, and William Edwards, Secretary, signed a charter granted to the new fire company by Westmoreland County in 1927.




Original Fire Department personnel pose in front of the first truck garage (built in 1929).

The departments' initial bi-laws were finally approved the same year. By 1929, the company had constructed its first permanent firehouse on Main Street. A new Seagrave chain-drive pumper was purchased in 1929; it proved its worth only a year later when a \$10,000 blaze destroyed Lazaar's Store and, thanks to the pumper, firemen were able to save the adjoining homes.

In 1938-39, a new building was erected and a social room added to it. In 1942, the company purchased a new Chevrolet Pumper and several years later bought a new Diamond T Squad Truck for rescue operations.

In 1958-59, the firemen erected a four-bay modern truck garage on Main Street. It was dedicated "in memory of our departed brothers called to higher duties by the biggest chief of all" on Sunday, August 23, 1959. The same day, a new International Seagrave Pumper was dedicated to the living members of the department.

History of V.F.D's Fundraising Activities


"Necessity is the mother of invention." That old saying perfectly describes the creative fundraising activities the firemen used to meet the needs of the community. The Westmoreland City Volunteer Fire Department first demonstrated that ability by showing a movie at the Manor Theater: **"Firemen Saved My Child."** Adults were charged 30 cents and children 15 cents; the profit was \$72.65. Then they began to hold dinners for \$1.00 per plate.

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In the early years, the popular Firemen's Fair was known as the "Firemen's Frolic." The Seagrave Pumper was used to advertise the event.

Canvassing the community for donations became common practice in the 1930's. One such campaign in nearby Shafton raised \$44.05. Throughout the Depression years, after four months in arrears, firemen would be suspended for non-payment of dues. When they got a few cents, they would pay up and be reinstated. Raffles were held to raise money; one raffle offered four tons of coal as a prize, reflecting the high value placed on coal in those days. The long tradition of the Pennsylvania Fireman's Fair was already alive in 1940 when the Westmoreland

Coal Company allowed the department to hold a fair in Biddle. "Any fireman not helping with the fair was fined \$2.00."

In 1955, President, Thomas Hoak, informed the department of a financial problem so severe that it might be forced to disband. It was then voted to pass out coin cards to the community, asking for \$3.00 per card. Today fire departments are still involved in fundraising activities all over western Pennsylvania. The events may have changed over the years, but the need remains the same.

History of the V.F.D.'s Community Service

In 1931, the department started a "Relief Association" by approving a plan to pay injured firemen \$1.00 per week. In case of death, the amount would be \$25.00.

By 1936, the department had initiated a "fireman's funeral service;" it was used for the first time at the death of Fire Chief, Joseph Hoak. Beginning in 1939, it was agreed to give firemens' widows \$5.00 at Christmas. In later years, it was voted to give them Christmas hams. In 1956, they started the tradition of activating the siren at short intervals when a fireman's funeral passed the fire hall.

After Pearl Harbor was attacked, the department offered the U. S. Government the right to use their facilities for national defense – to house the Red Cross or troops. During this time, Westmoreland City was divided into four districts. The firemen were to report any sign of sabotage to the National Defense Council. Fire and Air Raid Wardens were also designated. Donations were collected to erect a World War II monument for the recognition of service men and women from the Westmoreland City area. It was decided to place the monument in front of the fire department.

In 1948, the department loaned the Community Association \$500 to purchase the Biddle Playground from the Westmoreland Coal Company, and also made a \$500 donation.

In November 1950, the fire department was on duty 24 hours a day due to a major snowstorm that Thanksgiving weekend. During the 1950's, due to the possibility of an atomic attack, the department set up a civil defense unit. In the 1960's, the fire hall served as an air raid shelter.

In 1954, the department agreed to partner with the township for ambulance service. Rodgers and Snyder Funeral Homes provided the ambulances. In May, 1959, Rogers and Snyder Funeral Homes decided to end their ambulance service. After much discussion, it was finally agreed to purchase a Ford station wagon to be used as an ambulance. All the fire departments were to help pay for it and to man it. Nick Dubich volunteered to man it, representing the W.C.V.F.D.

The Westmoreland City Volunteer Fire Department has supported the community in every way imaginable. When your local fire company asks for community support, it's important to remember how they've benefited the people they've served for so many years. These dedicated volunteers best summed it up at the 1959 Building and Truck Dedication: *"We earnestly hope and pray that a mutual understanding may exist between the people of our communi-*



ty and our Fire Department so that we as voluntary firemen shall have at all times the best in manpower and equipment, so as to serve you to the best of our ability at all times." They've been doing just that since 1925!
